STATS ACROSS THE COUNTRY

Domestic Violence

1 in 4 women and **1 in 10** men experience sexual violence, physical violence, and/or stalking by an intimate partner during their lifetime.

1 in 2 female murder victims and **1 in 13** male murder victims are killed by intimate partners.

On a typical day, there are more than **20,000** phone calls placed to domestic violence hotlines nationwide.

Intimate partner violence is estimated to cost the US economy between **\$5.8 billion and \$12.6 billion** annually.

Sexual Assault

1 in 5 women and **1 in 40** men in the United States are victims of rape or attempted rape during their lifetime.

From 2016 through 2018, the number of rape/sexual assault victimizations in the United States increased **146%**.

19.1 million women and **6.4 million** men in the United States have been stalked.



STATS ACROSS UTAH

Domestic Violence

33.6% of Utah women and **21.4%** of Utah men experience intimate partner physical violence, intimate partner sexual violence, and/or intimate partner stalking in their lifetimes.

The Utah Domestic Violence Coalition reports that every year approximately **80** Utah children will witness the murder or attempted murder of their mother.

Sexual Assault

The costs resulting from sexual violence in 2011 totaled nearly **\$5 billion**, almost **\$1,700** per Utah resident.

The CDC estimates that **18.1%** of Utah women have been raped, with nearly half of Utah's female population (**47.8%**) having experienced some form of sexual violence in her life other than rape.

Rape is the only violent crime for which Utah's rate is higher than the national average, and this has been the case for the past **25** years.

NEW AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

Heart of Ogden - At YCC, we understand that awareness and prevention are vital to mitigating the risk of domestic and sexual violence. However, this last year, it was nearly impossible to hold in-person events with the rapid spread of Covid-19.

In order to raise awareness and encourage community engagement while apart, YCC held its first-ever Heart of Ogden campaign. The campaign was a huge success, with many community members learning for the first time what services YCC offers.

Giant conversation hearts were spread around Ogden. On the back of each heart was a QR code leading to a donation form to support the mission of YCC. Donors gave generously. YCC is excited to continue this tradition yearly.

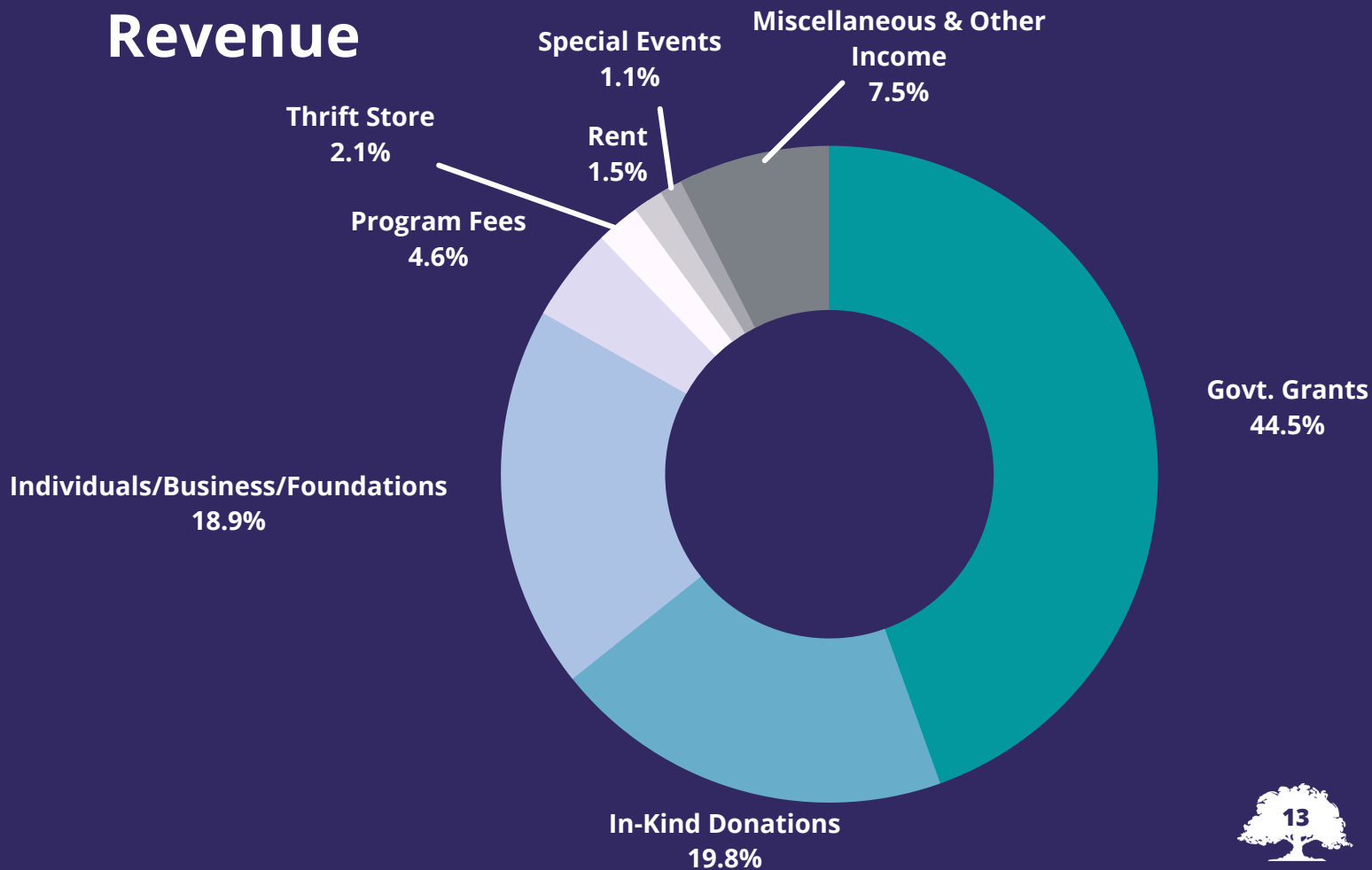

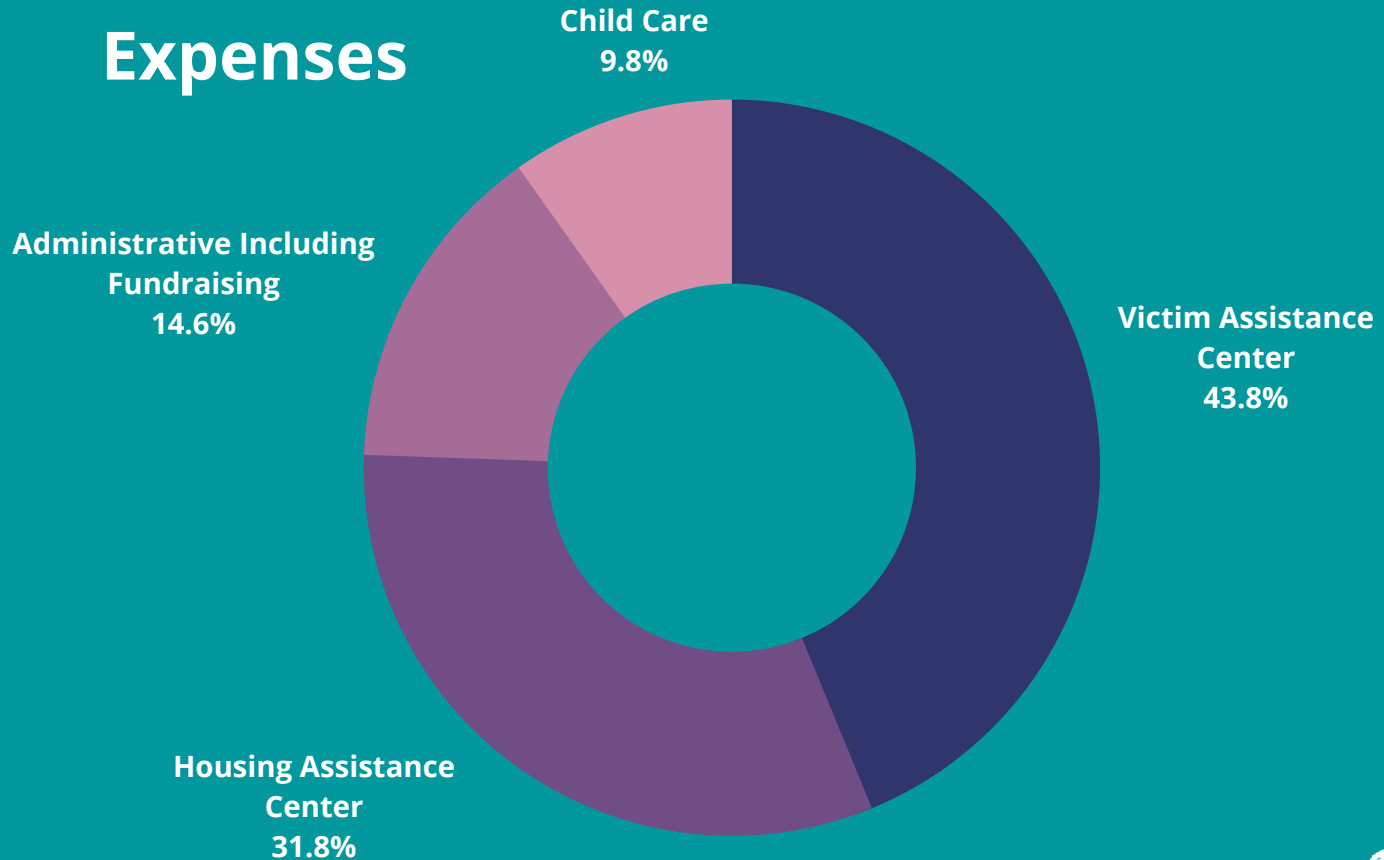
